A Year of **IMPACT**



This past year, thanks to your contributions, the Children’s Home Society achieved many successes on behalf of children and families. You allowed us to be innovative, experience transformative growth, advocate on a local, state, and national level, and elevate our impact on the broader field – the four pathways outlined in our strategic plan.

We are long-known for our work in adoption and foster care, and we remain steadfast in this work, with significant increases in the number of children served through our Foster Care to Permanency and Child-Focused Adoption Recruitment program.

In addition, we saw tremendous growth in our Intensive Family Preservation efforts last year, to prevent children from ever entering the foster care system. We maintained impressive outcomes, with 99 percent of families remaining intact after case closure, saving the state of North Carolina \$17.4 million.

We continued the national expansion of our Wise Guys male responsibility and teen pregnancy prevention program by offering the program outside of North Carolina in seven states. Through extension of Wise Guys and broadening our ability to train other organizations and professionals, CHS is increasing our impact exponentially beyond what we can offer through direct service.

We also added SaySo (Strong Able Youth Speaking Out) to our family of programs, bringing more than 500 voices of youth in foster care into our fold to advocate for the betterment of the foster care system – and to provide more opportunities for skill-building and development.

It truly has been a year of impact, made possible through your support. Thank you for all you do.

SaySo (Strong Able Youth Speaking Out) is a youth-led advocacy organization that represents the first-person voice of foster care. SaySo informs youth about services and resources available to them, teaches them essential life skills, and empowers them to use their voice to impact the system in a positive manner.

Child-Focused Recruitment is dedicated exclusively to placing the longest-waiting children in foster care into adoptive families. The program connects youth with extended family sharing genetic, legal, or social relationships, or an adoptive family uniquely suited for the youth.
